INTRODUCTION

The Pawtucket Police Department is proud to present its 2020 Annual Report. We continuously strive to identify and address crime and quality of life concerns within our community. We are committed to working with the community to help ensure Pawtucket is a safe place for all to live, work, and visit.

2020 HIGHLIGHTS

2020 was an unusual year for us all. The COVID-19 pandemic began to seriously affect Rhode Island in March 2020. This brought about challenges in all walks of life, including law enforcement. There were nearly daily updates regarding recommended personal protective equipment (PPE), including a backlog to try to order any, unknowns about how the virus spread, what to do if an officer was exposed, how to plan for continued coverage to the residents of Pawtucket if the department had a large amount of officers out with the virus, etc. Throughout it all, the members of the Pawtucket Police Department continued to work day in and day out in a time of unknowns, including not knowing what they were exposed to nor what they were potentially bringing home to their families. The pandemic affected nearly every aspect of life, as you will see detailed in this annual report by a reduction in some crimes and traffic related offenses, as well as delayed criminal proceedings.

What many believed would be a brief relief of COVID-19 in the beginning of the summer, June 2020 saw nearly unprecedented times for law enforcement across the country with civil unrest and, in some states, riots taking place. During the week of June 8, 2020, nearly every member of the department was called back to prepare for potential civil unrest within the city and also to assist outside agencies, including the Providence Police Department, when requested. Luckily, there was minimal to no damage to any businesses or residences in Pawtucket.

The remainder of 2020 saw another surge of COVID-19, but we were more prepared this time. Pawtucket had several COVID-19 testing sites within the city and the police department had ordered PPE to ensure our officers were as protected as they could be, while there were still many questions about the ever-changing virus.

The Patrol Division and the Special Squad Unit worked in collaboration to identify and address narcotic related offenses in Pawtucket. Special Squad members investigated over five hundred narcotics related incidents. Through their work, approximately \$1,773,000 worth of narcotics was seized in 2020.

In 2020, twelve (12) new officers completed the Municipal Police Academy and were sworn in as officers as part of our mission to fully staff the department to meet the needs of the community. Eight (8) officers were promoted to varying ranks from detective to detective captain.

Detective Division

The Detective Division of the Pawtucket Police Department, under the direction of Major Daniel Mullen, is responsible for the investigation of the majority of misdemeanor crimes and all felonies. Assisting in the oversight of the division is Detective Captain Shawn Driscoll.

The Detective Division is divided geographically into east and west districts, with five detectives assigned to each side of the city. Two detectives are assigned to the Youth Services Bureau and one detective handles all financial crimes. Detective Sergeant Christopher LeFort supervises the major crimes and financial crime detectives, along with assigning all reported crime investigations and arrest follow-ups. Detective Sergeant Theodore Georgitsis supervises the Youth Services Bureau and had supervised the Identification Bureau until the appointment of Sergeant William McCaughey to the Identification Bureau in October 2020. Detective Sergeant Georgitsis also supervises the distribution and completion of felony packages assigned to detectives.

In 2020, there were 2,343 cases forwarded to the Detective Division, of which 853 were felonies. The financial crimes investigator, Detective Edward Berube, handled over 275 financial crime investigations, to include check, credit/debit card, and identity fraud, embezzlement, and obtaining money/goods and/or services under false pretenses.

There were also 441 felony screening cases presented to the Rhode Island Attorney General's Office. These numbers reflect a continued effort to resolve felony cases and prosecute these most dangerous offenders.

In 2020, the Major Crimes Unit saw the retirement of Detective Captain Napoleon Gonsalves, Detective Raymond Doran and Detective Hans Cute. Captain Shawn Driscoll was promoted to detective captain and Officers Alias Imondi, James Baino, and Douglas Harrington were promoted to detective. Detective Paul Trout was also promoted to the rank of sergeant.

Detective Sergeant Christopher LeFort and Detective Sergeant Theodore Georgitsis serve as the public information officers for the department. These duties include answering any and all media inquiries, as well as issuing press releases and scheduling press conferences for any major incident.

Detective Charles Devine has been credentialed as a Special United States Deputy Marshal and served on the Violent Fugitive Task Force (VFTF). He is also trained in the administration of the Computerized Voice Stress Analyzer (CVSA). The CVSA is a pseudoscientific technology that aims to infer deception from stress measured in the voice. (The latest version of the CVSA enjoys the reputation of being the most effective investigative tool to be introduced into the law enforcement community within the past three decades).

Detective Susan Cormier is presently overseeing the division's cold case files.

Detective Trevor Lefebvre is currently trained in Cellebrite cell phone computer forensics, allowing for cell phone extractions to be completed in house. He is also part of the department's K9 Team. Detective Lefebvre and K9 Watson serve as a therapy team and have assisted in numerous interviews with victims and families of violent felony assaults, robberies, sexual assaults, child molestations and death investigations.

Detective Justin Gould serves as a member of the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force Unit of the Rhode Island State Police (RISP). His assistance has resulted in the state and federal prosecution of cases involving child pornography.

In order to keep current with the latest technology and investigative techniques, detectives assigned to the Major Crimes Unit attended the following trainings:

Youth Services Bureau

The Youth Services Bureau (YSB) is a branch of the Detective Division and is responsible for investigating and prosecuting crimes involving juvenile offenders. The primary goal of the YSB is to assist in the rehabilitation of all juvenile offenders, either through Family Court or through some other court-approved diversion program.

In 2020, the Pawtucket Police Department generated 170 juvenile arrest reports for the following offenses:

The YSB is staffed with two detectives and one detective sergeant. Detective Jessica Goostray is designated as the Family Court Prosecuting Detective. Her primary duties are the presentation of wayward cases before the Family Court, service of all Family Court summonses, and investigating criminal offenses. She is responsible for the initial arraignment and pre-trial hearings of wayward juveniles presented by the Pawtucket Police Department before the Family Court. She also prepares delinquent juvenile cases for presentation to the Attorney General's Office. She is charged with maintaining the YSB records and ensuring that case files are complete and prepared for presentation to the Family Court.

The Family Court Prosecuting Detective serves as the primary liaison between the Pawtucket Police Department and the Attorney General's Office, the Public Defender's Office, defense counsel and the Family Court Clerk's Office.

Detective Douglas Harrington is responsible for investigating criminal offenses involving juvenile offenders, and he is also assigned to handle graffiti matters and all wayward/disobedient & missing child/runaway reports. Running away from home can be indicative of future wayward/disobedient behavior; therefore, following up on all reports of missing children/runaways is of vital importance. As an early intervention, detectives communicate to the parents of runaways that there are social services available to them and aid them in procuring these services.

Further, both detectives ensure that troubled juveniles and their parents are directed to the appropriate social services agency. YSB detectives follow-up these cases with petitions to Family Court when it is deemed appropriate. YSB detectives also work closely with the School Resource Officers (SRO's) and frequently exchange information. The goal is to mediate impending problems at the schools and to implement the appropriate law enforcement action when needed to avoid school disruptions.

Detective Sergeant Theodore Georgitsis is the officer in charge of the YSB. He oversees the daily operation of the YSB. He also prepares and presents cases to be heard before the Pawtucket Juvenile Hearing Board and serves as the liaison to the Pawtucket Prevention Coalition.

In addition to the above mentioned responsibilities, YSB detectives are crossed trained with the detectives from the Major Crimes Unit and are placed on the on call list and called back to duty after hours to investigate major crimes committed by either juvenile or adult offenders. Moreover, detectives assigned to the YSB routinely handle investigations from the Major Crimes Unit as needed.

Juvenile Hearing Board

The Juvenile Hearing Board (JHB) was once again instrumental in our effort to rehabilitate juvenile offenders. The board is comprised of eleven (11) Pawtucket citizens appointed by the Mayor of Pawtucket and confirmed by the Pawtucket City Council.

The current JHB members are Chairwoman *Diane Dufresne, Alexander Danso, Felisberto Fontes, Chris Villegas, Maribel Echeverry, John McNichols Sr., Carol Osso, Max Silva, Jesus Diaz, Tyler McFeeters. and Gregory Ames.*

The YSB was able to divert 14 juvenile offenders from Family Court to be heard by the JHB. The JHB yearly report breaks down the demographics of the juveniles forwarded to the hearing board and the offenses committed (detailed below).

Identification Bureau

The duties and responsibilities of the Identification Bureau include the processing of certain crime and other scenes; such as homicides, felony assaults, sexual assaults, burglaries, robberies, arsons, breaking and enterings, death investigations, home invasions, car jackings, serious motor vehicle accidents, officer involved shootings, industrial accidents and recovered stolen property. Scenes are documented using digital photography and videography. The scene is measured and diagrams are created when necessary. Physical evidence is collected and preserved to be analyzed for DNA and latent fingerprints. Evidence is packaged for delivery to the Rhode Island State Crime Laboratory, the Rhode Island Department of Health, and to assist the Rhode Island State Medical Examiner in identifying victims in death investigations.

All sworn police personnel assigned to the Identification Bureau have attended and graduated from or are currently attending the two semester University of Rhode Island Criminal Investigation & Scientific Evidence Course. In addition, all sworn police personnel are active members of the Rhode Island Criminalistics Association.

Other Duties and Responsibilities of the Identification Bureau

Crime Scene Schedule and Investigative Procedures:

All sworn personnel assigned to the Identification Bureau are on a rotating twenty-four (24) hour call back schedule. This schedule consists of one member being readily available for call out for crime scene processing.

While at crime scenes Identification Bureau officers employ the most modern techniques of crime scene preservation, crime scene search, and the collection, preservation, and transmission of physical evidence. Their emphasis is on forensic photography, lifting and classification of latent fingerprints, obtaining DNA samples, and report writing.

Latent fingerprint evidence is submitted to the Rhode Island State Crime Lab for entry into CAFIS—the automated fingerprint identification system, for comparison against known criminal fingerprints.

When items of evidence are biological in nature they are submitted to the Rhode Island Department of Health for entry into CODIS (the FBI's searchable DNA database for all law enforcement agencies). This system enables law enforcement agencies to compare submitted evidence collected from various crimes to thousands of convicted felons in the system. With this information the Identification Bureau has the opportunity to conclusively identify those suspected of having committed crimes.

Administrative Assignments:

The Identification Bureau is also responsible for removing criminal fingerprint cards from the classification system upon expungement of arrest records. The arrest record is then permanently sealed or destroyed.

The personnel of the Identification Bureau are responsible for classifying all fingerprints which are taken, utilizing the Henry fingerprint classification system, and to maintain an up to date adult arrest file system.

The Identification Bureau is also responsible for issuing departmental identification cards for all active and retired police personnel, as well as civilian employees.

Identification Bureau personnel also photograph promotional ceremonies within the department and at times assists various divisions within city hall.

Civilian Criminal Record Checks and National Background Checks:

The Identification Bureau provides national background checks, which require fingerprints of civilians for employment. The national background checks are conducted by appointment only on Wednesdays between the hours of 1230hrs-1500hrs. These national background checks are done for various reasons, including adoption, firearm permits, child care, foster care, massage therapy, group homes, medical marijuana, and for the board of education.

The Identification Bureau conducts hundreds of criminal records checks for residents volunteering within the Pawtucket School Department, Pawtucket Housing Authority, and various other agencies.

The Identification Bureau also performs criminal records checks for the City Clerk's Office. These checks are done for people applying for licenses to operate businesses within Pawtucket or for individual's requesting a name change or guardianship through the probate court. Also, criminal records checks are done for Pawtucket's personnel department for employment purposes.

Sexual Offender Registration:

The Identification Bureau is responsible for the registration of convicted sexual offenders which is mandated under Rhode Island General Laws (§§ 11-37.1-3, 11-37.1-4, and 11-37.1-5) for all offenders currently living within the City of Pawtucket. During office hours it is the Identification Bureau's responsibility for the fingerprinting and photographing of these offenders, keeping track of registration requirements, and entering offender's information into the NCIC database.

The Identification Bureau is also responsible for maintaining offender information and updating their registration forms within separate files and in the department's computer system (i.e., IMC). The Identification Bureau works closely with the Rhode Island Department of Corrections, the Sex Offender Community Notification Unit, the Rhode Island Sex Offender Registry and other city and state agencies. Also, the Identification Bureau works closely with Detective Sergeant Theodore Georgitsis of the department's Major Crimes Unit in monitoring the whereabouts of the offenders. This is achieved by conducting unscheduled visits to their homes to verify that they actually reside where they claim to.

Identification Technician and Duties:

Bethany Quinlan is assigned on a full time basis to the Identification Bureau and has been since July of 2006. She works a forty (40) hour work week Monday through Friday.

Ms. Quinlan's duties are as follows:

- Taking fingerprints
- Classifying fingerprint cards
- Filing classified fingerprint cards
- Entering modus cards into IMC
- Conducting criminal background checks on local, state, NCIC, and III level
- Submitting charge adjustments to the Attorney General's Office
- Answering all incoming phone calls that are office related

- Making appointments for fingerprinting and maintaining the appointment book
- Maintaining sex offender files and enter all information into the NCIC database
- Registering sex offenders on a quarterly or yearly basis depending on the law

Special Squad

Overview

The Pawtucket Police Special Squad is responsible for investigating a wide range of criminal activity. These criminal activities include narcotics violations, prostitution and sex trafficking, illegal gambling, illegal sales of tobacco products, and illegal weapons sales, as well as other special investigations requested through the Major Crimes Unit, the Office of Professional Standards, and/or the Chief of Police.

Personnel

The Special Squad currently consists of one (1) detective lieutenant, one (1) detective sergeant, and nine (9) detectives. There were two personnel change in 2020. One detective was promoted to the rank of sergeant, and one detective retired. In total, there are currently nine (9) officers/detectives assigned to the Special Squad. We plan on filling the two open spots in 2021.

Several of the detectives in the Special Squad are assigned to task forces in either a full time or part time role. One detective is assigned full time to the Rhode Island Drug Enforcement Administration Task Force (DEA). One detective is assigned full time to the Rhode Island High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Task Force (HIDTA). One detective is assigned part time to the Rhode Island Human Trafficking Task Force (HTTF), which is overseen by Homeland Security Investigations (HSI). One detective is assigned part time to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms (ATF). One detective is assigned part time to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) Safe Streets Task Force.

The assignments of these detectives have proven to be highly successful in coordinating law enforcement efforts between state, federal, and local agencies. The combined efforts and resources assist in combating the complex and lucrative drug trade and other illegal activities that derive from the sale and distribution of illegal narcotics. Many of the federal agencies can provide resources that would otherwise be unavailable to the Pawtucket Police Department. The Special Squad works with and maintains close contact with several other agencies, including the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the United State Secret Service, the United States Postal Service, the Adult Correctional Institution, the Rhode Island Department of Probation and Parole, the Rhode Island State Police, the Rhode Island Attorney General's Office, the Rhode Island Division of Taxation, and the Rhode Island Registry of Motor Vehicles, as well as every other Rhode Island police department and surrounding Massachusetts police departments.

Search Warrants

The Special Squad applied for and executed a total of seventy-one (71) court ordered search warrants in 2020. The Special Squad assisted other law enforcement agencies in seventy (70) search warrants in 2020. These search warrants could only be obtained through countless hours of surveillance, research and other investigative techniques utilized by members of the Special Squad. The search warrants were obtained for persons, residences, businesses, vehicles, storage units, cell phones, laptops, bank accounts, GPS, and buccal swabs (DNA). The execution of these search warrants resulted in numerous arrests as well as the seizure of significant amounts of narcotics and proceeds derived from these illegal sales. During the execution of the search warrants, eleven (11) firearms were seized. All the firearms seized were deemed operable, many of which were loaded or had ammunition readily available where the firearm was located.

Drug Related Incidents and Investigations

The Special Squad received over sixty-one (61) tips, concerns, or complaints regarding narcotic activity. The information came from the patrol division, city residents, the City Council, the Mayor's Office, or the narcotics hotline.

The Special Squad investigated over five hundred one (501) incidents involving narcotics. These incidents were an accumulation of patrol arrests, search warrants, marijuana citations, arrest warrants, and Special Squad investigations.

Drug Seizures

Through a combined effort of the entire Pawtucket Police Department, a large quantity of narcotics were seized and taken off the streets. As in previous years, the main drug seized was marijuana (77 cases). In the vast majority of those cases, the amount was less than 2.5 ounces and a citation was issued. The other drugs seized were heroin (15 cases); crack cocaine (56 cases); and cocaine (36 cases). The remaining drug cases (115) were seizures of various pills, liquids, unknown drug types, and other illicit narcotics. As in previous years, we have had an increase of Fentanyl seizures. A majority of these Fentanyl seizures were counterfeit pressed pills. There has been an increase in the seizure of pure powder Fentanyl or other narcotics having a trace amount of Fentanyl or a Fentanyl analog in it. Approximately \$1,773,000 worth of narcotics was seized in 2020.

In 2020 all narcotics pertaining to closed cases were packaged in boxes and marked for destruction. All narcotics and paraphernalia pertaining to these cases were properly destroyed.

The Pawtucket Police Department offers an anonymous prescription drop off container for anyone who wishes to drop off expired and unwanted prescription drugs. This container is located in the front entrance of the police station. The Special Squad empties this container on a weekly basis, and processes the discarded drugs for destruction. The Pawtucket Police Department also participates in the DEA Drug Take Back Program which is held every year. In 2020, the Pawtucket Police Department collected one hundred sixty-three pounds (163 lbs.) of unwanted prescription drugs which were turned over to the DEA for destruction.

Drug Overdoses / Death Investigations

There were one hundred sixty-three (163) reported drug overdoses in 2020 within the City of Pawtucket. A majority of those overdoses involved heroin or fentanyl. There were thirty-four (34) death investigations involving narcotics or possible narcotic use. A majority of those are believed to involve heroin/fentanyl or a fentanyl analogue. The Special Squad works closely with detectives from the Major Crimes Unit, Identification Bureau and the Rhode Island Medical Examiner's Office to determine the exact cause of death in these cases.

Since 2017, the Pawtucket Police Department has been trained on how to properly administer Narcan, and all officers that received the training were issued nasal Narcan doses to carry on their person. In 2019, all officers were retrained in the proper use of Narcan during CPR training. In October 2020, the Pawtucket Police Department received new Narcan from the RIDOH CARA Grant Program. All expiring Narcan was donated to RICARES which will distribute them through programs they run throughout the city and surrounding areas. In 2020, there were seventeen (17) incidents where a member of the Pawtucket Police Department had to administer Narcan to a person that was possibly having a drug overdose. In every case the Narcan was effective in reviving the suspect.

Non Drug Related Assignments

In 2019, the Pawtucket Police Department received numerous complaints of prostitution being conducted out of massage parlors in Pawtucket. Search Warrants were conducted on three massage parlors, and several arrests were made. All three massage parlors have been completely shut down, and there were no complaints in 2020.

Future Issues

Since the new Rhode Island laws pertaining to marijuana were enacted in 2011, there has been a steady increase in the illegal growing, manufacturing, and selling of marijuana as well as various other forms of marijuana such as dabs, hash oils and wax.

In 2020, the Special Squad conducted investigations on several large scale marijuana grow operations in Pawtucket. Those investigations resulted in the arrest of several subjects, the seizure of over one hundred forty-three (143) plants, and the seizure of various growing materials. The Special Squad also investigated numerous complaints of residents growing marijuana in their residence. A majority of those were individual's that were growing marijuana legally in accordance with the Rhode Island General Laws.

The State of Rhode Island recently updated some laws pertaining to the cultivation and selling of marijuana, which came into effect on January 1, 2017. Under the new law, patients, care givers and co-ops are no longer permitted to sell their excess marijuana to the three medical marijuana dispensaries in Rhode Island. Instead, they are now required to destroy all excess marijuana. This change to the law may cause the illegal sale of marijuana to increase.

The state also enacted a tagging law that requires all marijuana plants to have a bar coded tag attached to the plant, which will be monitored by the Rhode Island Department of Health and the Department of Business Regulation. The State of Rhode Island is in the process of reviewing the medical marijuana possession limits, which may result in a reduction to those limits.

As in previous years, there has been an increase in the sale and use of fentanyl within Pawtucket. Fentanyl is commonly mixed with heroin to produce a greater "high." The ingestion of too much fentanyl can result with the user overdosing and possible respiratory failure and cardiac arrest.

The Special Squad is continuously trying to stay up to date on various techniques on combating the ever growing narcotics problem. The Special Squad often holds in house trainings as well as attends outside trainings. All members have completed the two-week Drug Enforcement Administration Basic Narcotics Class. Several members attended trainings and seminars in regards to the ongoing opioid epidemic in Rhode Island. Several members are scheduled to attend other narcotics enforcement related trainings this upcoming year.

The Special Squad recently purchased and updated some of their surveillance and communication equipment. These items are instrumental in surveillance, apprehension, and conviction of subjects conducting illegal activities in Pawtucket.

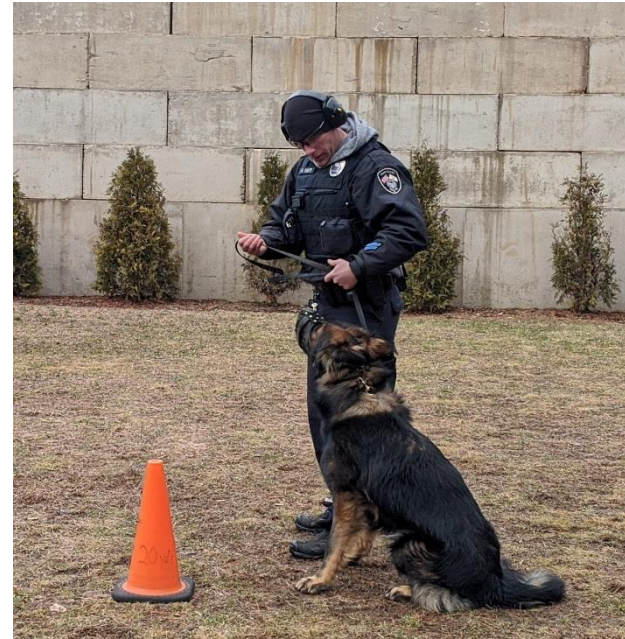


K-9 Unit

The Pawtucket Police K9 Unit is highly trained and ready to assist the department in apprehending suspects, recovering evidence, and locating lost/missing persons. The K9 Unit is also prepared and capable of providing protection and crowd control during large scale disturbances.

In addition to enhancing the effectiveness of the department's patrol and investigative divisions, members of the K9 Unit also participate in community events and often collaborate with the Community Policing Unit. Throughout 2020, and during the COVID-19 pandemic, the K9 Unit maintained their certifications as well as attended their scheduled in-service trainings.

The K9 Unit is overseen by Captain David Holden (Lead K9 Coordinator) & Sergeant Emmanuel Mejia (Assistant K9 Coordinator). The Patrol Division has two dual-purpose patrol/narcotic detection K9s (Argo & Magno) as well as a tracking K9 (Neko). In addition to these canines, the Detective Division has an assigned therapy K9 (Watson).



Dual-Purpose Patrol/Narcotic Detection K9s

K9 Argo is assigned to 2nd Platoon Patrol Officer Gregory Malo and K9 Magno is assigned to 1st Platoon Patrol Officer James Leach. Both Patrol/Narcotic Detection K9 Teams are certified by the American Police Canine Association (APCA).

They each conducted 288 hours of in-service training and 312 hours of off-duty sustainment/maintenance training; the off-duty training was at no cost to the city. The following graph displays the on-duty deployments of the dual-purpose K9s:

Throughout the aforementioned deployments, K9 Argo was responsible for the apprehension of three individuals by way of peaceful surrender. He also located a knife used in the commission of a felonious assault during an article/evidence search. Both K9 Argo & K9 Magno were responsible for the location/seizure of large quantities of cocaine.

Along with assisting other divisions within the Pawtucket Police Department, the dual-purpose K9s have also assisted various outside law enforcement agencies which include the Central Falls Police Department, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), the Providence Police Department, and the United States Postal Inspection Service (USPIS).

In addition to their patrol duties, the dual-purpose K9s also participated in two community events throughout the year. The following table displays the events attended by these K9s:

Tracking K9

The K9 Tracking Team has conducted 192 hours of in-service training, and 64 hours of off-duty sustainment/maintenance training at no cost to the city. Therapy K9

K9 Watson is assigned to Detective Trevor Lefebvre of the Major Crimes Unit. They are certified as a K9 therapy team by Pet Partners. The K9 Therapy Team conducted 96 hours of in-service training and 182 hours of off-duty sustainment/maintenance training at no cost to the city. The K9 Therapy Team has assisted in interviews of special victims (i.e., victims and families of violent felony assaults, robberies, sexual assaults, child molestation and death investigations). In addition, the team also participated in a variety of community events.

In February of 2020, K9 Watson began a new K9 therapy training program at the direction of Woonsocket K9 Officer Jason Berthelete. It is to be noted that from mid-March to early-June, K9 Watson remained out-of-service due to COVID-19 public exposure concerns.



Throughout 2020, K9 Watson worked with the following organizations: The Child Advocacy Center at Day One, the Blackstone Valley Tourism Council, the Attorney General’s Office, Hasbro Children’s Hospital, Pawtucket YMCA, the Girl Scouts of America, Darlington Early Childhood Center, Special Olympics of Rhode Island, Elizabeth Baldwin Elementary School and Myron J. Outlook

Although the COVID-19 pandemic affected the total overall deployments of the K9 Unit, all K9 teams remained persistent in conducting their in-service and off-duty sustainment/maintenance training. Members of the K9 Unit continued to demonstrate their commitment to their specialized roles within the department.

Officers Malo & Leach have dedicated a tremendous amount of time improving the K9 training site they developed. They furnished the inside of the building to resemble a residence, and they built environmental obstacles for their dogs to maneuver. The facility is used daily for maintenance training (e.g., narcotics searches, building searches, bite problems, etc.).

Detective Lefebvre & Officer Figura are also devoted to their roles as K9 handlers, and they attempted new endeavors this year. Detective Lefebvre spearheaded the effort to get K9 Watson certified as a visiting dog at Hasbro Children’s hospital; unfortunately, due to COVID-19, the hospital indefinitely postponed the application process. In addition, Officer Figura hoped to attend another Northeast Houndsmen Seminar, but the event was also cancelled due to COVID-19.



Prosecution Division

The Pawtucket Police Prosecution Unit operates within the framework of the Detective Division and is under the supervision of Sergeant Richard Laforest.

The mission of the Prosecution Unit is to ensure that every felony, misdemeanor and civil violation is presented to the Rhode Island Judicial System in its complete and proper form and to follow its progress through the system to a final disposition.

The unit is responsible for presenting all arrestees before the Sixth Division District Court for initial appearance and arraignment, as well as preparing these cases for all of the court proceedings, including grand jury, violation hearings, pre-trials, and trials.

The Prosecution Unit is responsible for the daily arraignment calendar and as such they are responsible for preparing the necessary paperwork required by the Rhode Island District Court and presentment of the cases to the presiding judge. Each morning members of the Prosecution Unit review every police report along with witness statements, DV/SA forms, and other documentation. This review and preparation must be thorough and accurate. A mistake could result in a defendant being wrongly incarcerated or result in a potentially dangerous subject being improperly released. The Prosecution Unit is the final check before arrest reports are presented to the court. At this stage in the criminal justice system, the defendant will either enter a plea or the case will be passed for pre-trial or referred to Superior Court for felony complaints. The prosecution officer is responsible for requesting bail and in some instances arguing with defense attorneys in regards to bail amounts and special conditions of bail being requested. The prosecution officer is then responsible for the data input regarding each case; this enables the police department to successfully track each case. Additionally, they present warrants to the presiding judge for consideration, as well as enter the signed warrants into the NCIC/RILETS systems.

All misdemeanor cases that are not resolved at the arraignment stage are scheduled for a pre-trial hearing. At the initial pre-trial hearing the majority of the cases result in a continuance to enable both sides to complete the discovery process, contact witnesses and victims and for any further investigation. Rarely is the case resolved at the initial pre-trial appearance. If the case is not disposed of during pre-trial conferences, it is scheduled for trial.

Misdemeanor cases heard in the District Court are prosecuted by the City Solicitor's Office. In order to efficiently and effectively prosecute these cases a close working relationship with the City Solicitor and his associates is necessary. Regular meetings are scheduled with the City Solicitor and associates to discuss and strategize matters scheduled for trial. All misdemeanor case files are maintained by the Prosecution Unit and updated after each pre-trial and trial. Prosecution officers are responsible for the preparation of subpoenas, witness and victim contact, updating data in reports to reflect the status of the case, as well as making evidence available for trials and obtaining evidence from different sources. Answering discovery motions to the public defender and private attorneys in a timely manner is required to satisfy Rule 16 of the District Court. These duties are generally completed by Sergeant Laforest but all prosecution officers are cross trained to handle all of these duties.

The Prosecution Unit is responsible for the presentment of all felony cases to the Rhode Island Attorney General's Office for information signing and grand jury presentation. A prosecution officer reviews all felony packages completed by detectives, exhibits the packages, and submit them to the Rhode Island Attorney General's Office for prosecution. This is completed on a bi-weekly basis, where a prosecution officer responds to the Attorney General's Office and confers with a Special Assistant Attorney General and goes over the facts of each case. This task is usually assigned to Sgt. Laforest.

Clerk Brenda Ricci handles all daily administrative functions in the office that include covering telephone calls from the public, prosecutors, attorneys, domestic violence advocates and department personnel. The Prosecution Unit is also responsible for arrest warrants from the time of signing until arrest or other disposition. Clerk Ricci maintains and updates the arrest warrant records and statute of limitation procedure governed by Rhode Island General Laws § 12-12-17. Clerk Ricci is also responsible for the timely management of all expungement requests and orders. Clerk Ricci also handles any requests from the Attorney General's Office for additional information concerning felony cases and the scheduling of officers and preparation of subpoenas for victims and witnesses for all upcoming felony court dates.

The Law Enforcement Advocate, Natalia Rosa, is paid for by a Federal Department of Justice Victims of Crime Act grant. Ms. Rosa assists the office in prosecuting domestic violence cases. She contacts and meets with victims of domestic violence and sexual assaults. She assesses their needs and further refers them to available resources. Ms. Rosa provides domestic violence training to the police department and keeps the Prosecution Unit updated on any new or proposed legislation. Ms. Rosa also informs and prepares victims for court proceedings, and she works closely with detectives to assist with victims as cases proceed through the investigation phase.

In 2020 in excess of 636 felony arrests, 1,373 misdemeanor arrests and 193 civil violation arrests were processed through the Prosecution Unit. There were 748 warrants presented and entered and 151 arrests on foreign or court warrants in 2020. Over 330 subpoenas were prepared and service attempted.



Traffic Division

The Pawtucket Police Department Traffic Division is responsible for the enforcement of traffic laws and the investigation of traffic accidents within the City of Pawtucket. The Traffic Division is also tasked with maintaining the Pawtucket Traffic Enforcement (PTE) Program as well as the Traffic Camera Safety Program. The Traffic Division is responsible for the arraignments and trials of defendants in Pawtucket Municipal Court and the Rhode Island Traffic Tribunal. The Traffic Division organizes traffic assistance for parades, funeral processions and road race events. The Traffic Division completes felony screening documentation for traffic related felony cases that are referred to the RI Attorney General's Office.

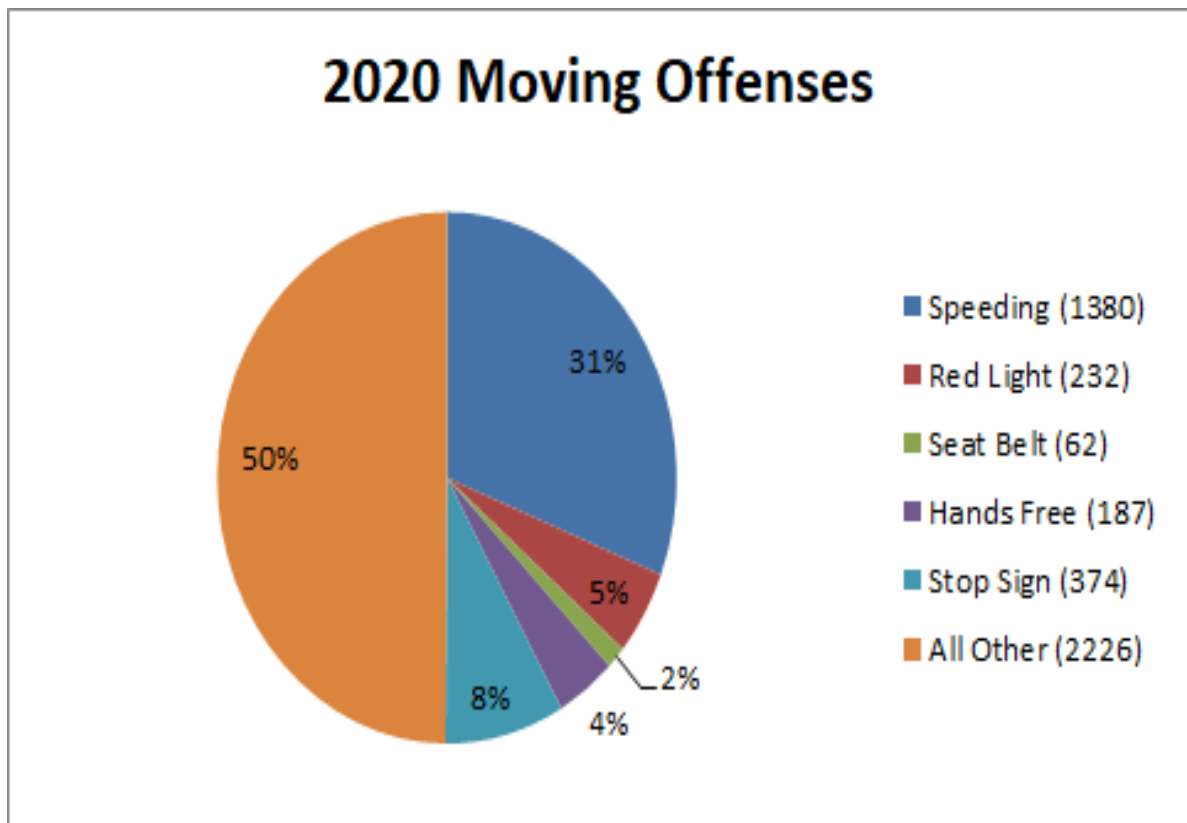

- The Traffic Division is responsible for investigating hit and run accidents, completing traffic surveys, and monitoring traffic problem areas within Pawtucket. There were 2,416 traffic accidents reported to the Pawtucket Police Department in the year 2020. Approximately 23% or 575 of those reported accidents were hit and run in nature.
- The Traffic Division receives a variety of traffic related complaints, from speeding to abandoned and illegally parked vehicles. The complaints are logged, evaluated and addressed through a coordinated effort between the Traffic Division, Patrol Division and Community Policing Unit.
- The PTE Program was established in 1993. The program is regulated by Pawtucket City Council Ordinance, Chapter 293, Section 1. The purpose of the program is to increase visibility while taking a strict approach towards traffic violations. The increased enforcement is intended to reduce the number of serious traffic accidents and to educate the public on traffic awareness and safety. Traffic enforcement posts are determined by reviewing citizen complaints, accident reports and information received from our two variable sign traffic trailers. In addition to the PTE Program, the Pawtucket Police

Department utilizes funds from several grants provided by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. The grant funds are for specific violations to include speeding, distracted driving and seat belt enforcement. The Traffic Division issued 1,380 speeding violations in 2020. There were a total of 4,461 citations issued by the Pawtucket Police Department in 2020.

- In 2020, the Pawtucket Police Department arrested 35 individuals for driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs. The department has 10 officers who received additional training in advanced roadside impaired driving enforcement, 2 of the officers are also trained as drug recognition experts. The trainings are funded through federal grants from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
- The Traffic Division is responsible for coordinating special event parade permits. In the event of a winter snowstorm or weather related emergency, the Traffic Division organizes police personnel to arrange for the removal of vehicles parked on city streets. There was 1 parking ban declared in 2020. During the snow emergency, 376 violations were issued with 187 motor vehicles towed from the roadways.
- In 2019, the City of Pawtucket entered into a contract with the Sensys Gatso Group, a provider of solutions in traffic management, specializing in automated traffic enforcement. The City of Pawtucket operates 10 automated school-zone speed-enforcement cameras and 11 automated red light cameras located at several major intersections throughout the city.
- Pawtucket Municipal Court currently operates three (3) days a week, Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays. Due to COVID-19 several modifications were made to the operation of the court.





Motorcycle Unit

The Pawtucket Police Department Motorcycle Unit consists of eight highly trained members. Each member has graduated from an intensive training course (80 Hours) for certification in the operation of police motorcycles. This training is sponsored by the Rhode Island Municipal Police Training Academy. The syllabus includes slow motorcycle control courses, emergency braking, tandem riding, vehicle stops, and escort duties. Additionally, members are offered the opportunity to attend an annual refresher course, typically held every April.

The police motorcycle fleet consists of three 2016 Harley Davidson Street Glides outfitted with police emergency lights, sirens, and police graphics. Additionally, a fourth motorcycle (2007 Harley Davidson Road King) is kept in storage and is primarily used for the training courses and when the need arises to deploy a fourth motorcycle.

In the calendar year 2020 the Motorcycle Unit was deployed approximately 21 times for special functions. These deployments included 18 funeral escorts. This year, the Motorcycle Unit participated in the "K-9 for Kids" event as well as "Santa at Slater Park". In addition, the unit is typically deployed to assist with special events such as escorting "Wreaths Across America," "Tour de Force," "Special Olympics Torch Run," several 5K races, etc. The unit also participates in the annual "Touch a Truck" event at McCoy stadium and community events such as "National Night Out" at Payne Park. The Motorcycle Unit leads the Pawtucket Police Department in the annual St. Patrick's Day Parade and the annual Aquidneck Island Police Parade. Finally, the unit is deployed annually to the July 3rd Fireworks event to assist with traffic, crowd control, and its ability to respond to emergencies in heavy traffic. This year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, many of these events/special functions were cancelled. In addition to the above mentioned special functions, the Motorcycle Unit is utilized in various day to day deployments, including traffic enforcement, routine patrol, patrol supervision, and other patrol related duties, as needed.

With the commitment demonstrated by team members, the Motorcycle Unit continues to represent the Pawtucket Police Department in a positive light.



Community Policing Unit

The Pawtucket Police Department's Community Policing Unit (CPU) is a dedicated liaison between the police department and the community. Members of the CPU attend meetings with community groups, crime watches, and other groups throughout the city. By meeting with citizens during non-emergency situations, officers are able to make personal connections and develop lasting community relationships.

Through community policing, citizens and law enforcement work together to identify and solve problems at the root cause. An advantage of community policing is that the problem does not have to be criminal for the police to get involved. Also, by involving the community and the police in problem solving, both groups have a vested interest in a viable solution along with a feeling of satisfaction when it works.

The Community Policing Unit strives to increase and improve relationships the department has with its community. These relationships are not limited only to citizens, but also to businesses and visitors. We want all people entering the city to feel safe, secure, and welcome while in Pawtucket. We also hope that anyone who has any concerns feels comfortable enough to report the complaint to the police and has faith the issue will be resolved.

The Community Policing Unit includes the school resource officers and is responsible for supervising the school crossing guards. In addition, the CPU handles various elderly affairs matters, oversees the Police Explorers Program, and is responsible for organizing community events.

School Resource Officers

Five officers are assigned as school resource officers (SROs). An SRO is assigned to each public middle school and the two high schools. They are assigned to a school to foster a relationship with the students and teachers. The personal relationships the SROs build with students lead to students being more open to bringing their personal problems to the attention of the SROs and alert the SROs of bigger problems that may be occurring both inside and outside of school. It also allows SROs to handle cases in the school on a more personal level, often meeting with parents and being able to divert students from being formally introduced into the criminal justice system. A supervisor in the Community Policing Unit acts as a liaison with the Pawtucket School Department.



This year the Community Policing Unit and SROs were presented with some difficult and different obstacles. COVID-19 forced schools to close in March for the remainder of the 2019/2020 school year. The Pawtucket Police Department, including the CPU, organized and assisted with zoom meetings, birthday parades and other events to continue to bring some smiles to the faces of Pawtucket residents.

The CPU teamed up with the school department to ensure the graduating high school students at Shea and Tolman were able to walk the stage for a virtual graduation. This took immense planning to ensure the safety of the students and staff. Each student along with their family was able to participate by walking the stage at McCoy Stadium.

The beginning of the 2020 school year consisted of only elementary schools opening. The Community Policing Unit developed new traffic patterns to ensure all COVID-19 protocols were followed. CPU officers were assigned to schools at the beginning and end of each school day to assist with traffic control.

Elderly Affairs

An officer in the Community Policing Unit serves as the department's elderly affairs advocate. This position investigates reports concerning elderly residents who may need additional resources. Working with the City of Pawtucket Division of Senior Services, the Rhode Island Office of Healthy Aging, and the East Bay Community Action Program, the elderly affairs advocate works to help the elderly with many different problems, including self-neglect, dementia, Alzheimer's, and elder abuse.

Crossing Guards

The school crossing guards fall under the supervision of the Community Policing Unit. The crossing guards increase the safety of students walking to and from school. They are strategically placed in locations based on factors such as foot traffic, age of students, volume of vehicular traffic, and dangerousness of the crossings. Before the start of each school year, all crossing guards receive training on their duties and responsibilities. Throughout the school year, the Community Policing Unit monitors the crossing posts to ensure safe conditions. In 2020, there were 28 crossing locations.



Police Explorers Program

The Pawtucket Police Explorers Program is for residents aged 14-20 that have completed 8th grade. The program introduces youths to the career of law enforcement. Explorers are also taught general skills, including public speaking and leadership behavior. Explorers also get involved in community service projects. Due to COVID-19 the program was suspended in March.

Community Events

The Community Policing Unit attends numerous city events throughout the year. Due to COVID-19, many of our annual events were unable to be held. However, by following social distancing protocols, we were able to assist with several food drives and community events to provide assistance to the citizens of Pawtucket. In addition, the CPU continued the tradition of adopting a family residing in Pawtucket who was in need during the holiday season. Also, the CPU assisted with the second annual K9s For Kids holiday event in Slater Park.



Planning and Training

FUNCTION

The policy of the Pawtucket Police Department is to actively develop plans and to conduct research to ensure that the agency is knowledgeable of innovations in law enforcement and the varying nature of the problems and concerns affecting law enforcement to ensure the department is properly trained and equipped to meet its organizational mission.

1. Provide statistical information concerning law enforcement functions.
2. Provide legislative updates affecting laws enacted and repealed.
3. Provide training bulletins concerning improved procedures.
4. Provide information concerning necessity for adopting or modifying policies.
5. Provide information concerning training requirements and opportunities.
6. Maintain the *Manual of Procedures*, which includes researching and writing new policies, reviewing and/or modifying existing policies and issuance of any such updates.
7. Provide introductory training for all newly assigned police officers and administer the Field Training Evaluation Program to newly assigned officers.

PERSONNEL

The Planning & Training Division is staffed with three full-time personnel: a captain, a sergeant, and a patrol officer. Officers throughout the department who have received specialized training in specific subject areas are assigned to the office periodically to conduct departmental training.

DUTIES

I. Firearms Instructors

Department firearms instructors are selected from throughout the department and receive formal training in the instruction of firearms. Firearms instructors are assigned to Planning & Training during the scheduled firearms training periods. In 2020, the department had 12 officers assigned as firearms instructors:

III. Background Investigators

Pre-employment background investigations are conducted by a formal Pre-Employment Background Investigation Unit assigned to the Planning & Training Division during times that such investigations are necessary. Completed investigations are submitted to the Chief of Police and candidates are then scheduled for final command staff review & interview. In 2020, the Pre-Employment Background Investigation Unit conducted 22 background investigations.

IV. In-Service Recruit Training

All newly assigned officers receive a comprehensive training series, which introduces new officers to the department's *Manual of Procedures* through lecture, video and discussions. New officers all receive an overview of defensive tactics, to include verbal skills and a review of all tactics learned while attending the police academy. The officers are tested and certified by department firearms and defensive tactics instructors. Bio-hazard training is provided by Pawtucket Healthcare and hepatitis inoculations are offered to newly assigned officers. Due to the academy being shortened because of COVID-19, indoctrination training took place over 3 weeks for both classes graduating in 2020. The extra time allowed newly hired officers to be involved in role playing scenarios using current field training officers. This additional training helped fill the gap with what was missed in the academy and helped new hires transition to going on patrol.

V. Hiring Process

The Planning & Training Division assists the City of Pawtucket Personnel Department with the recruitment of candidates for the position of police officer. Members of the Planning & Training Division plan, schedule and administer the physical agility assessment, proctor the written exam, and participate in the interview process. There was one hiring process conducted in 2020 which started with 109 applicants.

VI. Recruitment

The Planning & Training Division is responsible for processing candidates selected to attend the Rhode Island Municipal Police Training Academy. This includes purchasing uniforms and required books and supplies that are necessary for recruit training during the academy. Recruits enter a formal mentoring program and meet bi-monthly with the Planning & Training staff throughout the 20 week training program. The Planning & Training Division is the department liaison to the Rhode Island Municipal Police Training Academy and is responsible for coordinating all required equipment necessary for use by department sponsored candidates. The division meets with candidates and academy staff during academy attendance to monitor progress and assure a smooth transition to the department

VII. Police Officer Retraining

The Planning and Training Division works in conjunction with the Office of Professional Standards, under the Supervision of Captain Shawn Driscoll and Lieutenant Alan Mal during the year 2020, by retraining officers in policies, procedures, officer safety issues, and any other duties related to the Patrol Division.

VIII. Field Training & Evaluation Program

A formal Field Training & Evaluation Program is provided to all newly assigned officers. The OIC of Planning & Training assumes the responsibility of program coordinator. Field Training Officers (FTOs) are selected by the Chief of Police with recommendation from the program coordinator from a list of formally trained FTOs.

Field Training Officers document the field training progress and continually communicate with the Planning & Training Division as to the newly assigned officer's progress. This program is designed to last 12 weeks, with officers receiving 2 week introductory training through the Planning & Training Division. Officers are then assigned to a primary FTO for 4 weeks, a secondary FTO for 2 weeks and then a tertiary FTO for 2 weeks. Officers are then reassigned to the primary FTO for the final phase which they work on their own and are shadowed by the primary FTO.

The officers are then assigned to one of the three patrol platoons and are scheduled by the Officer-in-Charge to patrol assignments and the communications center to ensure that they are exposed to all their areas of responsibility. Officers receive formal department evaluations during the probationary period and become permanently assigned employees after one (1) year of a successful probationary period.

XI. Investigations

Background Investigations

The Planning and Training Division performed twenty two (22) background investigations on potential candidates. Office of Professional Standards

In 2020, the Pawtucket Police Department Office of Professional Standards saw several personnel changes. The command changed from Detective Captain Shawn Driscoll to Detective Lieutenant Alan Mal in the course of the year. Since 2019, Detective Sergeant Carrie Hormanski and Detective Sergeant Nathan Gallison were assigned to the Office of Professional Standards. In October of 2020, Detective Sergeant Matthew Braga replaced Detective Sergeant Gallison who left for a different position.

The Office of Professional Standards is under the direction of Police Chief Tina Goncalves. Internal investigations conducted by Office of Professional Standards are reported solely to the Chief of Police. All internal investigations are confidential in nature and are evaluated by the Chief of Police on a case by case basis for final disposition. Discipline on internal matters is determined by the Chief of Police.

The Office of Professional Standards:

1. Conducts numerous field inspection reports as requested by the Office of the City Clerk involving claims for payment by the city against police personnel and city employees.
2. Provides the Rhode Island Attorney General's Office with documented requests for Brady/Giglio information on all police personnel slated to testify as required by law.
3. Provides the courts with subpoenaed information on cases and officers.
4. Establishes and maintains a working relationship with the city solicitor, city attorney, prosecutors, and other attorneys as appropriate.
5. Responsible for the preparation of all *Law Enforcement Officer's Bill of Rights* cases.
6. Responsible for the security of all Office of Professional Standards files and records.
7. Maintains a working partnership with the Rhode Island Inter-local Trust and the law firm of DeSisto Law on pending cases and suits involving the City of Pawtucket and its employees.
8. Completes U-Visa applications forwarded to the department.

Goals of the Office of Professional Standards:

1. To thoroughly investigate all legitimate complaints/allegations of police misconduct originating from citizens or agency employees.
2. To improve the quality of police services and increase community support and confidence in the police department.

3. To establish a meaningful and effective complaint processing system that will facilitate police-citizen cooperation.
4. To monitor police officer's compliance with department rules, regulations and procedures.
5. To clarify rights and ensure due process protection to citizens and officers alike.
6. To identify "high risk liability" areas of police work and attempt to reduce them through effective training methods.

Responsibilities:

1. Assume responsibility for recording, controlling and reviewing all investigations of complaints against employees.
2. Assume responsibility for maintenance of all complaint investigation files, their review and analysis to monitor trends in the numbers and types of complaints.
3. Assist in positive discipline by being alert to potential problems and trends involving employee behavior, attitude or conditions of which the agency management should be aware.
4. Report all findings resulting from internal investigations of employee misconduct, improper procedures or poor service to the appropriate command personnel.

2020

One of the primary responsibilities of the Office of Professional Standards is to accept and investigate all complaints of police misconduct received from any citizen or agency employee. In total, there were 73 documented investigations in 2020. Investigations are placed into three categories:

1. Internally Generated Investigations (44)
Included in internally generated investigations are all officer involved motor vehicle accidents, which are reviewed by the Office of Professional Standards.
2. Externally Generated Investigations (21)
Citizen complaints are part of this category.
3. Field Inspection Investigations (8)
Field inspection reports are completed at the request of the Pawtucket City Clerk's Office for the Council Committee on Claims. Often a field inspection will be a review of an incident that has already been reviewed, such as a motor vehicle accident, but in all cases a request for a field inspection will generate a separate report. The Office of Professional Standards monitors all uses of force by department personnel. Each case is evaluated to ensure that the force used was justified and within the guidelines established by the department as well as the General Laws of the State of RI. In 2020, the

Office of Professional Standards began monthly reporting to the FBI National Use-of-Force Data Collection system.

Every type and degree of use of force used by members of the department, from physical controls to the discharge of a service weapon, is recorded on a Subject Aggression/Resistance Form by the officer and is reviewed by his or her supervisor and forwarded to the Office of Professional Standards for review.

MERIT AWARDS

Merit Awards are presented to officers who perform in an exceptional manner in an extremely dangerous situation. The following officers are receiving Merit Awards:

OFFICERS KYLE JUCKETT, MICHAEL W. DOLAN AD MATTHEW LEVASSEUR

On May 16, 2019, Officer Dolan responded to a 911 report of a disturbance. Upon his arrival, he was met by a male with severe lacerations to his face. The victim stated he had been stabbed by his mother's boyfriend and his mother was also stabbed and inside with the suspect. Officer Dolan immediately made entry and located the female victim who was bleeding heavily. Officers Juckett and Levasseur arrived on scene to assist and were able to locate the suspect and order him out of a bedroom at gunpoint. The suspect was placed in custody and the weapon located. Officers Dolan and Matthew Mello rendered aid to the female victim until Pawtucket Rescue arrived. Officer Dolan's quick action prevented the female victim from further injury or succumbing to her injuries.

OFFICERS ETHAN BARRETT AND MICHAEL R. MAGNUSSEN

On November 26, 2019, multiple officers responded to 179 Conant Street for a report of a disgruntled employee that entered the building with what appeared to be a firearm and was on the fourth floor of the business. Officers arrived and immediately went to the fourth floor and located the suspect. The suspect was ordered to stop and show his hands and did not comply. He then began running and Officers Barrett and Magnussen gave chase. The suspect drew the firearm in an attempt to discard it and was swiftly taken into custody by Officers Barrett and Magnussen. All officers who responded to this scene quickly ended an active shooting scenario peacefully.



COMMENDATION

AWARDS

Commendation Awards are presented to those officers that have exhibited exceptional police work. They are being recognized for outstanding achievement that reflects favorably on the individual officer as well as the Pawtucket Police Department. The actions of the officers are beyond their basic assignments, and where there is moderate risk. The following officers are receiving Commendation Awards:

DETECTIVE SERGEANT DINO GIORGIO

On January 23, 2019, officers responded to a call of a sexual assault with an armed suspect at 592 Weeden Street. A perimeter was formed for the duration of the barricade. Detective Sergeant Giorgio responded as a crisis negotiator as well as the State Police SWAT. The suspect was successfully negotiated out of the house by Det. Sergeant Giorgio and taken into custody by the SWAT team.

OFFICER TY B. KARALIS

On September 3, 2019, multiple Pawtucket Police units responded to Prospect Heights for a report of shots fired. Upon approaching the complex, Officer Karalis noticed a vehicle attempting to flee the scene and pursued the vehicle until it stopped. At this time a large unruly crowd began to gather. With the assistance of other officers to control the crowd, Officer Karalis was able to conduct a detailed investigation and located a firearm inside the vehicle. The operator of the vehicle was placed into custody and charged with License Required to Carry a Pistol.

DETECTIVE ERNEST R. PENDERGRASS, JR.

Four individuals were charged in U.S. District Court in Providence for their roles in an alleged drug trafficking and money laundering conspiracy that trafficked at least 50 kilograms of cocaine from Puerto Rico to Rhode Island through the U.S. Postal Service, and in return sent tens of thousands of dollars in drug trafficking proceeds to individuals in Puerto Rico.

According to court documents, the United States Postal Inspection Service (USPIS) identified approximately 51 Priority Mail parcels allegedly sent by members of a Drug Trafficking Organization (DTO) to various addresses in Rhode Island. USPIS agents determined that many of the shipments were tracked via USPS tracking information, and that several individuals monitored and retrieved the deliveries. The parcels were turned over to the alleged leaders of the DTO in Rhode Island.

Three of the alleged leaders of the DTO were ordered detained by a U.S. District Court Magistrate Judge on criminal complaints charging them with conspiracy to distribute and possession with intent to distribute a controlled substance; distribution of and possession with intent to distribute a controlled substance; unlawful use of a communication facility (U.S. Mail) to facilitate the distribution of a controlled substance; and conspiracy to engage in money laundering and money laundering.

An arrest warrant was issued for a fourth defendant.

OFFICERS DANIEL DOLAN JR., TY B. KARALIS AND MICHAEL R. MAGNUSSEN

On September 2, 2019, Officers Dolan, Karalis and Magnussen apprehended a man in possession of a shotgun attempting to flee in a vehicle from the scene of a disturbance on Merrick Street.

DETECTIVE DAVID R. MEDEIROS

In early 2019, the Special Squad unit received numerous complaints concerning prostitution being conducted out of massage parlors in Pawtucket. Detective Medeiros initiated the investigation on all the massage parlors in Pawtucket. He spent countless hours gathering background information on the spa's, surveillance and collected enough evidence of probable cause to get search warrants. The first operation resulted in the arrest of 13 individuals charged of Prostitution, Pandering, and License Required - Massage Parlor. A few months later, the massage parlors reopened and Detective Medeiros initiated another investigation resulting in the arrest of 19 individuals charged with Prostitution, Pandering, License Required - Massage Parlor, and Procurement of Sexual Conduct For a Fee. Over \$1,000,000 in currency and assets were seized during the operations. The investigation is ongoing with additional State and Federal charges pending.

OFFICERS JESS VENTURINI, GREGORY MARTIN AND TAYLOR FAY

On June 3, 2019, Officers Fay, Martin, and Venturini responded to an address for the report of a male with a shotgun. Patrol had responded to the same location earlier in the night for a stabbing, where the victim was uncooperative. Officers Venturini and Martin began shouting commands inside of the residence for anyone to exit the residence. At that time an irate male with a severe laceration to his head exited and was detained. Officers cleared the stairwell and a "sawed off" shotgun was located on the third floor landing. Officer Fay determined that the injured male had returned to the apartment to possibly assault someone inside. The male was subsequently charged with the possession of an illegal firearm and numerous other felony charges.



ACHIEVEMENT OF

EXCELLENCE

Achievement Awards for Excellence are presented to officers who demonstrate exceptional police work, in recognition of the officer for outstanding achievement that reflects credit upon himself/herself and the Department over and above their basic assignment. The following officers are receiving achievement Awards:

OFFICER THOMAS J. WYCISLAK

On January 23, 2019, Officer Wycislak responded to a call of a sexual assault. The initial investigation by the Officer determined that a 14 year old female was alleged to have been sexually assaulted and the suspect held a firearm to her head. The victim reported the suspect was still inside the home on Weeden Street. Officer Wycislak learned the armed suspect was still inside the residence and alerted officers arriving on scene. A perimeter was established and Sergeants Dino Giorgio and Kenneth Dolan responded as crisis negotiators along with the State Police SWAT team. The suspect was successfully negotiated out of the house by Sgt. Giorgio and was taken into custody by the SWAT team.

OFFICERS ALIAS V. IMONDI, TYLER SHEA AND MICHAEL DOLAN

On September 3, 2019 multiple Pawtucket Police Units responded to Prospect Heights for the report of shots being fired. Upon approaching the housing complex, Officer Karalis observed a vehicle attempting to flee the scene and pursued this vehicle until it stopped. At this time, a large unruly crowd began to gather. Officers Imondi, Shea, and Dolan maintained control of the crowd while another officer located a firearm inside of the vehicle. The operator of the vehicle was then placed into custody and charged with License Required for Carry a Pistol.

SERGEANT CARRIE A. HORMANSKI, DETECTIVES MICHAEL J. CIOE AND JUSTIN M. GOULD AND OFFICER ANDREW TORRES

The larceny of a firearm from the Hampton Inn on February 2, 2019 culminated into bizarre turn of events. Based on the initial reports taken by Officer Torres and follow up investigation by Patrol Sergeant Hormanski, Detectives Cioe and Gould unraveled a conspiracy as to the events that led into the firearm being reportedly stolen. The end result led to larceny and conspiracy charges being filed on three suspects and the recovery of the firearm.

OFFICERS GREGORY MARTIN, MICHAEL DOLAN, EVAN DELLA TORRE AND

TY B. KARALIS

On July 5, 2019, Officers Martin, Dolan, Della Torre and Karalis responded to the area of Warren Avenue where a reporting party stated a male on a motorcycle brandished a firearm at him and made a life threatening threat towards him. After units responded to the area, Officer Karalis located the suspect motorcycle and gave verbal commands for the operator to stop which were ignored. Officer Karalis pursued the motorcycle on foot until it entered a nearby driveway and the operator then fled into the backyard of the residence. Officers Della Torre, Martin and Dolan assisted Officer Karalis chasing the male who was apprehended as he attempted to climb a fence. Officer Martin checked the immediate area and a loaded firearm was located on the opposite of the fence. The suspect was charged with Felony Assault, License to Carry a Pistol and Possession of Cocaine.

DETECTIVES TREVOR P. LEFEBVRE AND CRAIG S. LETOURNEAU

Detective Lefebvre was called back to duty to investigate an armed robbery with a knife at the Newport Avenue Sunoco on December 30, 2019. Some video surveillance was obtained but did not provide any leads. A follow up on the original canvass for surveillance video led Detectives Lefebvre and Letourneau to a home where additional video footage was viewed. After speaking with the residents it was believed that one of the occupants or a friend thereof may have been involved in the robbery after an article of clothing from the robbery was located at the home. One of the residents was brought to the station for questioning where a confession was obtained and the suspect charged.

DETECTIVES TREVOR P. LEFEBVRE, CRAIG S. LETOURNEAU AND OFFICER JAMES R. BAINO JR.

Two instances of Breaking and Entering were reported on October 6, 2019 at McCoy Stadium and October 7, 2019 on Narragansett Park Drive. Digital evidence was obtained by the detectives and with the assistance of Officer Baino persons of interest were developed. Detectives Lefebvre and Letourneau were able to apprehend 11 individuals and obtain confessions.

DETECTIVE TREVOR P. LEFEBVRE

On May 31, 2019 a walk in report was made on allegations of child molestation and other sexual assault offenses. Detective Lefebvre was assigned to the case and worked diligently with various social service agencies. His case work not only brought forth an arrest and charges against the suspect involved, but also laid the foundation for other agencies in Massachusetts and Vermont to bring charges when it was learned that other crimes of the same nature occurred in their respective jurisdictions.

DETECTIVES TREVOR P. LEFEBVRE AND CRAIG S. LETOURNEAU

A Pawtucket hair salon was robbed at gunpoint on March 12, 2019 and the suspect fled from the store prior to officers' arrival. Detectives Letourneau and Lefebvre received information from Providence Police Department in regards to a similar robbery in their city and their investigation led to the identity of a suspect. The detectives tracked down a RI registration plate to the suspect through prior contacts and the suspect was arrested.

OFFICER AUSTIN Q. WEBB

On July 24, 2019, Officer Webb responded to the Tomlinson Sports Complex on Daggett Avenue for a report of an attempted break and entering into the concession stand. Upon arrival Officer Webb located two witnesses who provided Officer Webb with the facts and circumstances of the attempted break along with a still photograph of the suspect. Officer Webb used the information he obtained along with the photograph to identify the suspect in this incident. Detectives were able to locate the suspect who admitted to the attempted breaking and entering and identified and arrested two other suspects.

OFFICER EVAN DELLA TORRE

On June 06, 2019, Officers responded to a business on Broad Street for report of a breaking and entering. This was the second time this business was reported broken into in less than a month with over \$56,000 worth of merchandise stolen in the first incident. The owner of the business gave a physical description of a male who he saw running from the business as he arrived. Officer Della Torre was able to locate the suspect and after a foot pursuit and a brief struggle was able to place the suspect in custody. During a search, the suspect was found to be in possession of items stolen from the business. After an interview with detectives, the suspect confessed to the crimes and was charged accordingly.

DETECTIVES DENNIS R. SMITH AND JARED D. BOUDREAU

Detectives Smith and Boudreault conducted an investigation on a subject that has been arrested by Special Squad in the past for narcotics and weapons charges. After his brief time in prison, he immediately started selling narcotics again. The investigation led to houses in Providence and Pawtucket. After a couple months of surveillance and numerous narcotics purchases, they gathered enough evidence for search warrants for both houses which resulted in the seizure of Heroin, Fentanyl, Crack Cocaine, and two guns. Due to the abundance of evidence gathered by Detectives Smith and Boudreault, the subject immediately pled out to 25 year prison sentence.

DETECTIVE SCOTT R. SULLIVAN

For approximately six months, Detective Sullivan conducted an investigation on two subjects selling narcotics in Pawtucket. Detective Sullivan spent countless hours on surveillance, narcotic purchases, and gathered enough evidence for a search warrant. The subjects lived in the Central Falls and were suspects in several drive by shootings. Detective Sullivan

coordinated with the Central Falls Police Department and the RISP SWAT Team to execute the Search Warrant that resulted in the seizure of narcotics, several guns, and over \$40,000.00. The guns were processed to see if they were involved in any crimes.

DETECTIVE JARED D. BOUDREAULT

On September 30, 2019, Detective Boudreault received very limited information on a subject selling narcotics in Pawtucket who was unknown to the Pawtucket Police Department. Detective Boudreault immediately started an investigation on the subject and gathered enough probable cause to get a search warrant the following day. Upon the execution of the search warrant the following was seized: Over 1 kilo of Fentanyl, over \$79,000.00, a gun, and a vehicle. If it was not for the quick action of Detective Boudreault, this deadly drug would have been distributed throughout the city of Pawtucket.

DETECTIVE LIEUTENANT DAVID L. HOLDEN, DETECTIVE SERGEANT DINO GIORGIO, DETECTIVES SCOTT R. SULLIVAN, DENNIS R. SMITH, PETER J. DUHAMEL, JARED D. BOUDREAULT, DAVID R. MEDIEROS, CHRISTOPHER M. MILLER, MARIO A. COMELLA AND MICHAEL R. COSTIGAN

On June 7, 2019 Sergeant Donley responded to the report of a sexual assault on a juvenile that occurred near the bike path in Slater Park. Sgt. Donley was able to gain excellent information regarding the crime from the victim, located the scene of the crime and preserved it so that BCI Detectives could collect evidence. During the course of the

investigation, vital information was gained by Detective Charles Devine and Officer Gretchen Galvin who identified a suspect who was apprehended for First Degree Sexual Assault.

OFFICERS ETHAN BARRETT AND ANA C. VERTENTES

On June 16, 2019 Officer Vertentes was on routine patrol when she observed people gathering around a male who appeared in distress and she pulled over to assist. As she approached, the male became unresponsive and was barely breathing, then he stopped breathing. Officer Vertentes began checking the male's vital signs, could not find a pulse and he felt cold to the touch. She immediately began administering CPR and called for more cars and rescue. Officer Barrett arrived shortly after and administered Narcan to the male, which did not appear to have any affect. Officers Vertentes and Barrett performed CPR on the male for approximately 10 minutes until the rescue arrived. The male regained a pulse in the rescue en route to the hospital. If not for the life saving measures performed by these officers the outcome may have been very different and the victim may not have survived.

LIEUTENANT TIMOTHY M. GRAHAM, DETECTIVE SERGEANT DINO GIORGIO, DETECTIVES SCOTT R. SULLIVAN, DENNIS R. SMITH, PETER J. DUHAMEL, ERNEST R. PENDERGRASS, JR., JARED D. BOUDREAULT, CHRISTOPHER M. MILLER, MARIO A. COMELLA AND MICHAEL R. COSTIGAN

OFFICER MICHAEL R. MAGNUSSEN

On December 15, 2019, Officer Magnusen was on patrol in the area of Slater and Main Streets when his attention was drawn to a suspicious vehicle. Upon further investigation of the vehicle and its occupants, a loaded pistol was located inside the vehicle. Three individuals were detained, and two were ultimately charged with crimes. The vehicle in question had been pursued numerous times by area departments in the past without success and was impounded.

OFFICERS ANTHONY RICHARDS, ZACHARY K. BALLOU, NICHOLAS J. WEAKLEY AND BRIAN A. VESTRI

On November 27, 2019 Officers Richards, Ballou, Weakley, and Vestri responded to Joes Barber Shop on Pawtucket Avenue for a commercial alarm. Officers quickly determined that

a Breaking and entering had just occurred. They cleared the building and immediately began a search of the area. Officer Richards remained on scene and relayed pertinent information to Officers Ballou, Weakly, and Vestri who located the suspect and the stolen merchandise in the vicinity of the crime scene.

OFFICER JONATHAN G. GAGNON

On October 6, 2019, Officer Gagnon responded to a fire report. He identified the crime as First Degree Arson after learning an occupied residence had been set on fire. Officer Gagnon quickly located nearby surveillance video which allowed him to identify two suspects and he swiftly apprehended them nearby.

DETECTIVE MICHAEL R. COSTIGAN

On May 23, 2019, Patrol Officers in the area of Exchange Street were attempting to locate a stolen motor vehicle in the possession of a known suspect. Officers on scene observed the suspect in a different vehicle, which was also stolen, and a vehicle pursuit was initiated. As officers began to pursue the vehicle on Route 95 South, Detective Costigan headed into the area to assist. The vehicle pursuit was terminated just prior to the Providence line and Detective Costigan monitored the suspect in the stolen vehicle from his unmarked vehicle and kept control notified of the suspect's location and actions as officers attempted to notify other jurisdictions.

Detective Costigan continued to follow the suspect as he travelled back into Pawtucket, eventually exiting Route 95 onto Fountain Street. Officer Gagnon was in the area on a road construction detail. The suspect in the stolen vehicle, upon seeing Officer Gagnon, drove onto the curb and struck the officer with the vehicle, attempting to flee the area. Detective Costigan communicated the events and the direction of travel of the vehicle to officers and continued to follow the vehicle into Central Falls. The suspect attempted to flee on foot but was quickly apprehended by Detective Costigan and arrested for numerous felonies, including a felony assault on a fellow police officer.

OFFICER DOUGLAS HARRINGTON

On March 28, 2019, Officer Harrington responded to the area of the CVS pharmacy located on Newport Avenue in reference to a robbery by a suspect armed with a knife. A description of the suspect was broadcast. The Cumberland Farms on Division Street had also been robbed several hours prior to the CVS and the same CVS pharmacy had been robbed the day before, during which the suspect had displayed a box cutter. Officer Harrington located a person matching the description of the suspect walking on Walcott Street. Although the person did not have any weapons on him, he told Officer Harrington that he had just left the CVS. The person was later arrested and after speaking with detectives, he confessed and was charged with all three robberies.

OFFICERS RONALD JONES AND CAISEY F. CALABRO

On March 20, 2019, Officers Ronald Jones and Caisey Calabro responded to the Main Street Bridge, located at the intersection with Roosevelt Avenue for a suicidal female threatening to jump off the bridge into the Blackstone River. Upon arrival they observed a female sitting on a pillar at the edge of the bridge directly above a waterfall to the Blackstone River. Officer Calabro began a conversation with the female in an attempt to calm her. Concerned that the female may jump/fall into the river, Officer Jones positioned himself behind the female as she spoke with Officer Calabro. Officer Jones wrapped his arms around her waist and he and Officer Calabro assisted her off the pillar and to a position of safety. The female had stated that she wanted to kill herself and she was transported to the hospital for a psychological evaluation.

OFFICER CHRISTOPHER M. SERPA

On March 13, 2019, officers were dispatched to Slater Middle School for a commercial alarm. Shortly after Officer Serpa's arrival, he heard a vehicle horn. He located the vehicle which had struck the school. The operator was resting his head on the steering wheel and was in and out of consciousness with a large amount of blood throughout the vehicle. Officer Serpa removed the operator from the vehicle and began rendering aid. Other officers had arrived on scene, including Officer Magnussen. After checking for injuries, officers observed what appeared to be a stab wound on the operator's left arm. Due to the large amount of blood the operator was losing from his wound, Officers Magnussen and Serpa applied a tourniquet on his left upper arm and waited for rescue personnel to arrive. The operator was transported to the hospital by rescue personnel, where he recovered from his injury. Personnel on the transporting rescue stated that the actions of these officers on scene saved the man's life.

OFFICERS ZACHARY J. DAY, MICHAEL DOLAN AND NICHOLAS M. CROFT

On August 2, 2019, Officer Dolan, while patrolling his district, was flagged down by a motorist. The motorist indicated her juvenile son was just robbed of his sneakers at knife point by four individuals and the suspects fled the area on bicycles. Officer Dolan obtained a brief description and located the potential suspects riding a short distance away. Upon his approach, one suspect jumped from his bicycle and began to run from the scene and Officer Dolan pursued him. The suspect attempted to enter an unknown residence and he was apprehended by Officer Dolan. Subsequently, Officers Day and Croft apprehended another suspect that attempted to flee on foot after being noticed by police.



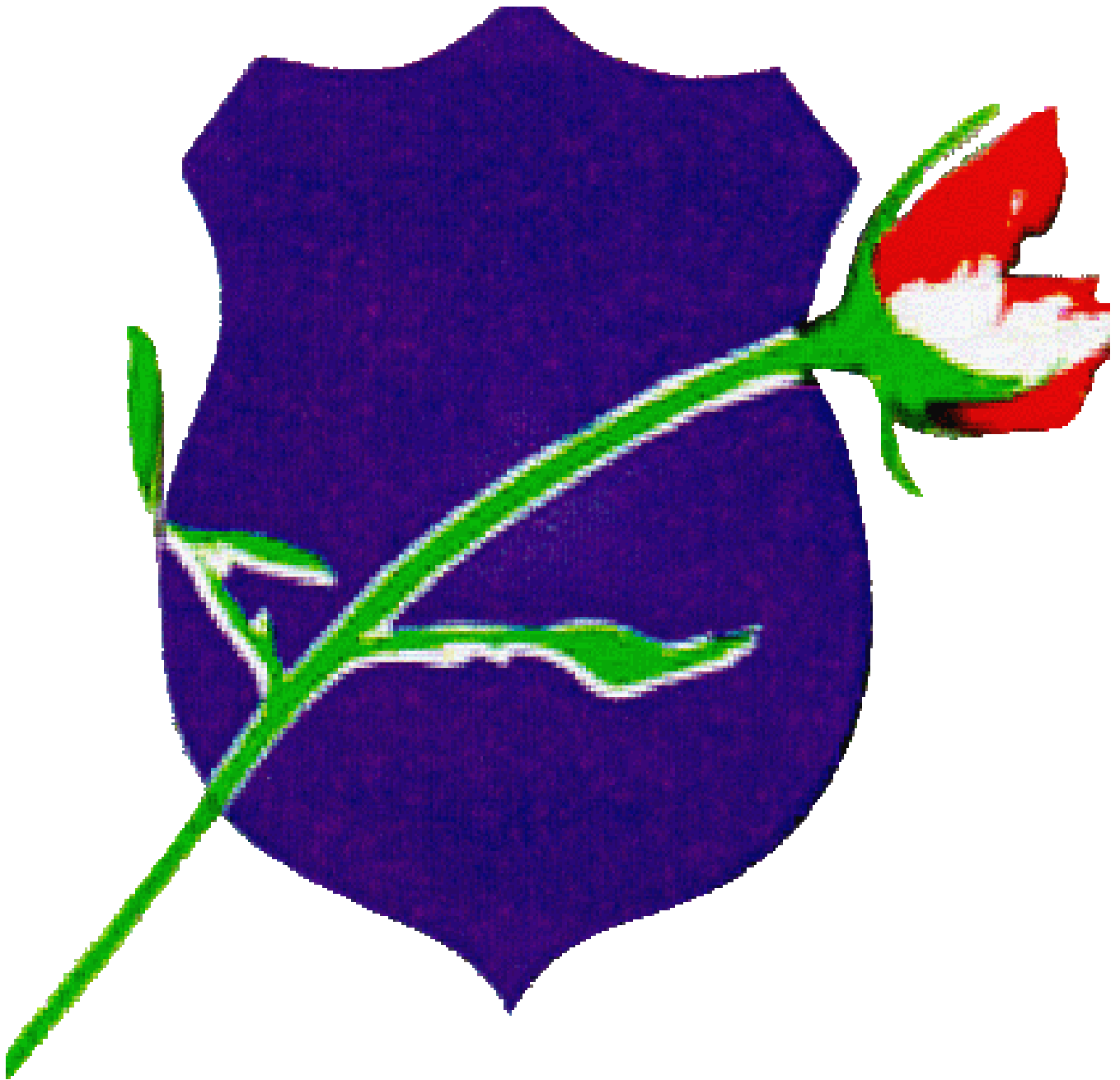

Description: Patrolman Slocum suffered a fatal heart attack after a foot pursuit of an armed suspect. Patrolman Slocum answered a disturbance call where an intoxicated man was brandishing a pistol and threatening the neighbors. When the suspect saw Patrolman Slocum he fled the scene. Patrolman Slocum pursued the suspect on foot for about one block until he captured and subdued him. After placing the suspect in handcuffs, Patrolman Slocum suffered a massive heart attack and died.

WILLIAM WETHERSPOON GEMMELL

Patrol Statistics

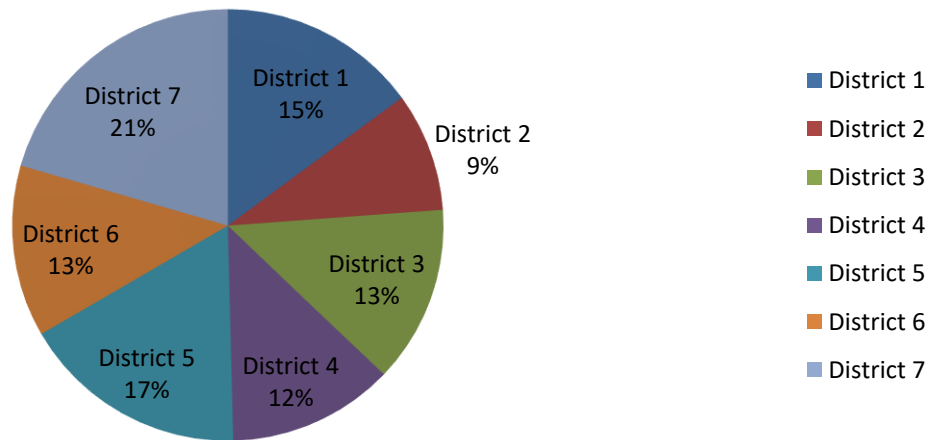
The following statistics concerning breakdowns of district and police shift/platoon have been generated using the Pawtucket Police Department's internal computer aided dispatch system and record management system. The Pawtucket Police Department participates in the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). Users should be aware that computer aided dispatch generated reporting statistics will differ from those illustrated by the Unified Crime Reports provided at the end of this section.

Any "administrative calls," such as transport meals to station, police vehicle inventory, officer's meals, officer personal reasons, etc., were eliminated when analyzing the calls for service data. The information for incident and arrest reports includes all reports, including those completed by detectives, members of the Special Squad, school resource officers, etc., and were counted in the respective shift when the report was completed. The analysis counts when the reports were completed, not time when the incidents occurred, which can sometimes be delayed.

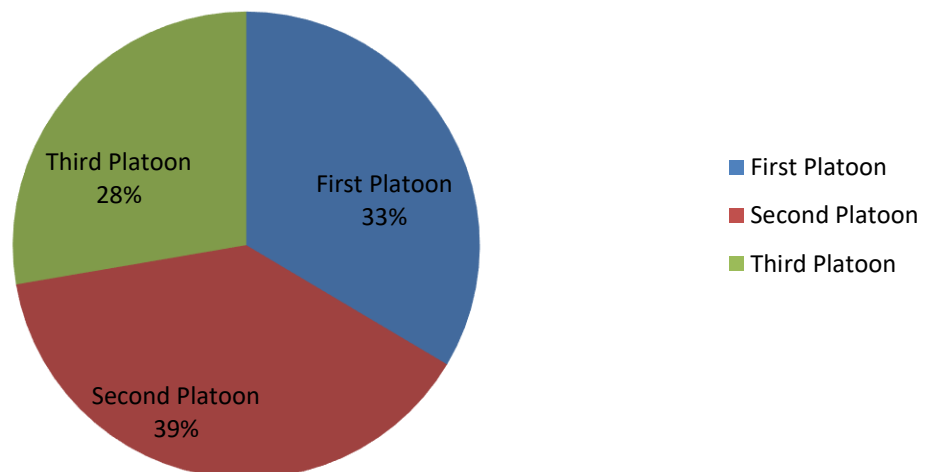

2020 Calls for Service by District

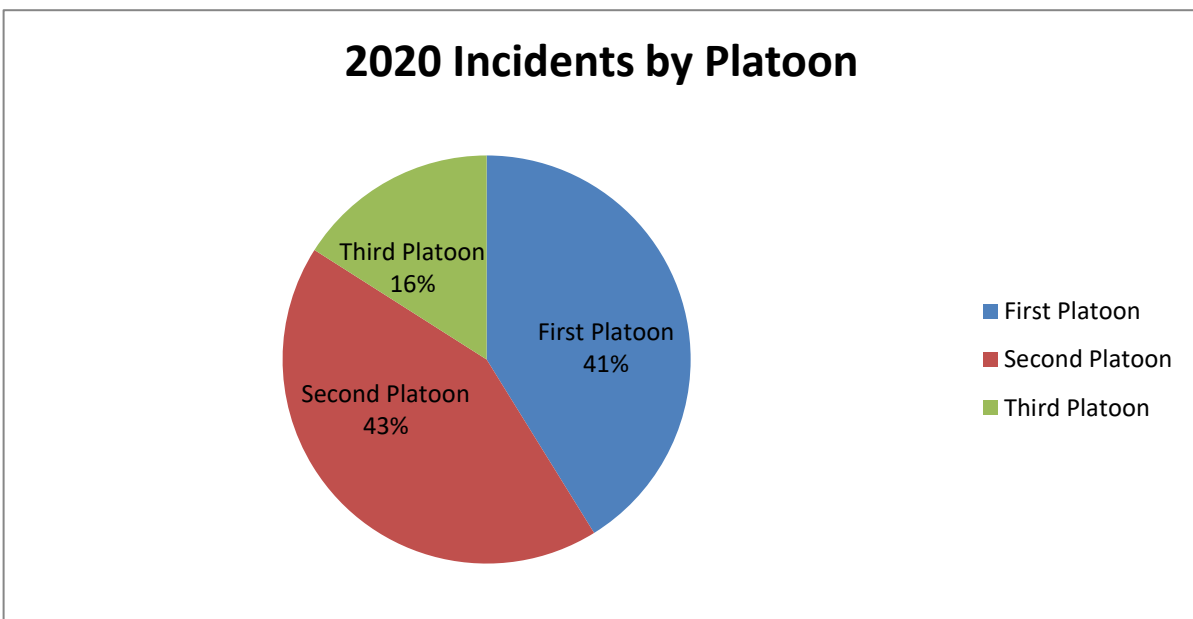
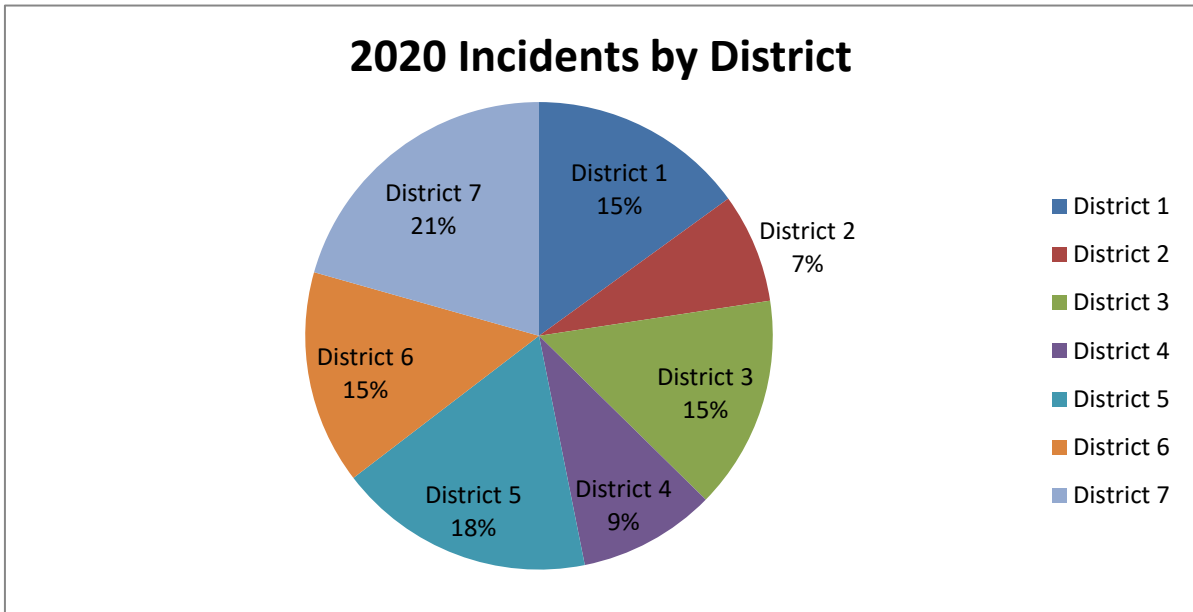


2020 Calls for Service by Platoon

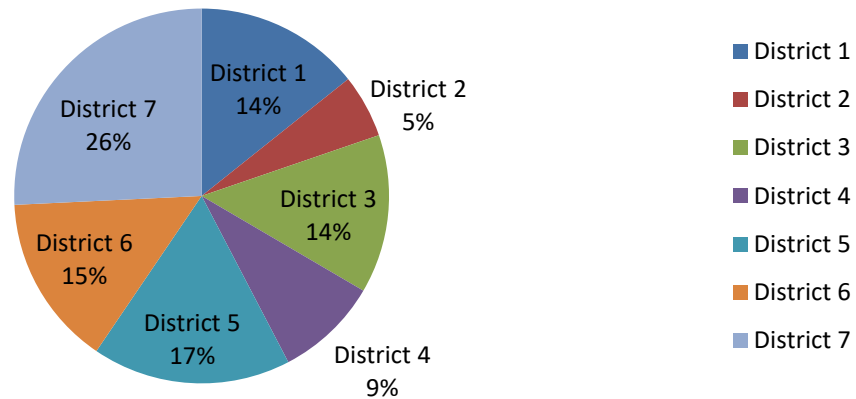

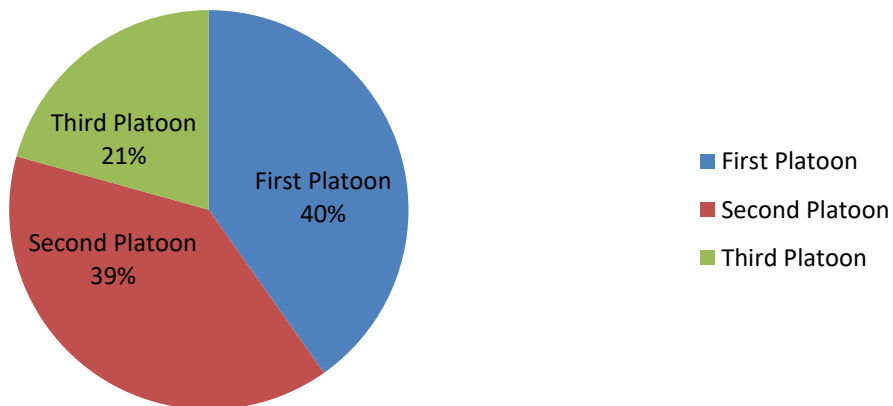
